Honesty is speaking the truth. Saying things that aren't true, or that you think might not be true, or that you are making up to hide the truth are all types of lies. Lying is not honest (also called being dishonest) because you are saying something that isn't true. Examples of what speaking the honest truth means:

- Honesty means you don't say things about people that aren't true. You are not being honest if you make up rumours about someone or if you share rumours someone else made up.
- Being honest means you admit to your actions, even if you'll get in trouble. You are not being honest if you deny you did something wrong when you really did it.
 - Honesty means you explain how a situation really happened. You are not being honest if you say something happened one way when it really happened another way.

Part of honesty is what you say and how you act toward others. But another part of the definition of honesty is whether you treat yourself the same way. Being honest with yourself means you really know why you are acting in a certain way or whether what you tell yourself is true. This part of the definition of honesty includes when you are trying to convince yourself you didn't really do something wrong, or it wasn't that bad, even though you know it was.

What have we been learning?

Frida Kahlo Class - This term has been full of fun, excitement and thrills. The children have been very excited to learn the songs for our Christmas nativity. The children were so brave during the Christmas nativity and performed their parts wonderfully! They have enjoyed creating Christmas crafts for our tree.

They have all worked hard in their lessons, enjoying the story in English called 'I'm Going to Eat this Ant' by Chris Naylor Ballesteros. We created our own models of how we would stop the anteater from eating the ants and Reception wrote a sentence describing what they would do to stop the anteater.

In maths, we have been focusing on numbers to 5, talking about one more and one less and singing nursery rhymes associated with this. We have also been looking at the 2D shapes (circle, triangles, squares and rectangles). The children are really good at describing these shapes.

We hope everyone has a wonderful Christmas and we look forward to starting afresh in January! Have a lovely break!













Stephen Hawking Class - It has been a busy half term in Stephen Hawking Class! After half term, we continued on with our curriculum and have been learning lots of new things. Our main project this term has been 'Let's explore the world'. In this topic, we have learnt about some of the features of the UK and then compared them with Somalia. This has been a great opportunity for the children to learn how to read and use maps, discover other places around the world and their country.

Across the curriculum, we have been widening our knowledge and deepening our understanding of many different topics. In science, we have been looking at habitats and how plants and animals adapt to survive. In RE, we have been learning about the Nativity story and learnt about why this is such an important story in the Bible for Christians. Also, the children created our own Nativity scenes out of cardboard boxes to represent the important people that were a part of the birth of Jesus.



We have had a number of days at school where we have learnt about lots of other important events and topics. During science week, we all had a turn at conducting scientific experiments. We created our own ice-cream, exploding bags and tested out what materials made the best umbrellas to keep Incy Wincy Spider dry.





Finally, we had our first open morning! We were joined by parents and carers and everyone had a go at making their own pizza. We made our dough from scratch, shaped our pizza bases and topped them with all of our favourite ingredients. The pizzas were fantastic and the children were able to test their cooking skills by weighing out ingredients and kneading their dough.



Well done to all of the children for making this a fantastic autumn term! We hope that you all have a lovely Christmas break and come back ready and refreshed for the spring term!



Nick Vujicic Class – The children have had a very busy term in Nick Vujicic's class. The children have enjoyed our English lessons which have focussed on our core text 'The Lost Happy Endings' by Carol Ann Duffy. The children have worked hard with their punctuation skills and have done a deep dive into the language related to fairy tales, using expanded noun phrases, similes, metaphors and personification, enriching their writing.

In maths, we have covered more addition and subtraction. Also, we have learnt about length and perimeter, as well as multiplication and division. We always use a range of resources in maths to support our concrete and pictorial learning.

In science, we explored the solar system and how our planet moves around the sun. The children developed their understanding of how daytime and night time works, which was closely connected to our geography topic about time zones and how our position in relation to the sun in the solar system.

The children have had some amazing experiences in Bushcraft this term, building elaborate dens, throwing axes and archery.

We have spent a lot of time doing Christmas related things. Also, the children have been rehearsing for our amazing nativity.

The children from Year 5 and Year 6 finished have their swimming lessons and have improved their skills and confidence in the water.

We had some memorable trips this term. We went to Norwich to visit the Synagogue and the Catholic Cathedral. The children brought back so much knowledge from the two very different places of worship. During the science week, we did some amazing experiments and had the opportunity to visit the Sea Life Centre in Great Yarmouth.
